SENDING NUDES & SEXTING


This factsheet explains the possible consequences of sending or sharing intimate or sexually explicit messages, images, photos or videos.

Sexting refers to the sharing of sexually explicit or nude images, messages and videos online.

Elephant Ed's 4 hot tips

1. Collect evidence

Take screenshots of the content before deleting.

2. Delete and untag

Untag and ask those with image to delete and not share further.

3. Report

Report to social media service or through eSafety website.

4. Self-care

Talk to a trusted adult and seek help from support services.
